MEETINGS

It takes a lot of time and effort to coordinate the work being done in schools and across districts. That means there are a ton of meetings at which people share what's happening, ask for input, and work together to create new approaches.

Each of the meetings listed below is a regular meeting that contributes to the running of the school/district. For this section of your passport: (1) ask your cooperating teacher to introduce you to a member of each team, (2) check in with the person you'd like to shadow and identify the time of the meeting, the purpose of the group, and what you should bring, (3) arrive on time and participate full, and (4) journal about your experience - "In what ways do outside involvements positively impact a teacher's ability to do his/her job?"

DUTIES


