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

Oregon Career Connected Learning Framework




OREGON CAREER CONNECTED LEARNING



Oregon defines the stages of career development through a system of Career Connected Learning, a framework of career awareness, exploration, preparation and training that is both learner-relevant and directly linked to professional and industry-based expectations.











Oregon Career Connected Learning

Why Career Connected Learning?

- Engages students by connecting their future to the classroom through authentic work and career experiences
- Supports student goal setting and planning their career and college paths
- CCL experiences are scaffolded to jump-start and support student learning
- Brings employers and educators together
- Plays a role in Oregon's economic recovery through pathways to livable/sustainable wages for all learners

Oregon's Vision for CTE

Oregon will reimagine and transform learner experiences to enhance learners' future prospects; empower their communities; and ensure equity in an inclusive, sustainable, innovation-based economy.





Oregon's Work-Based Learning Vision





Leading Through Perkins V: Oregon's CTE Vision

Expand work-based learning in equitable ways so that all learners have equal opportunity and access to professional skills and social capital to be successful when they move through education and training into the workforce.





Oregon WBL definition

"...structured learning in the workplace or simulated work environment that provides opportunities for sustained interactions with industry or community professionals. This interaction fosters in-depth, first-hand experience of the expectation and application of knowledge and skills that are required in a career field."





Benefits of work-based learning for learners

Research on K-12 education:

- Lower dropout rates
- Higher attendance
- Higher graduation rates
- Positively impacts professional skills development

Research on Postsecondary education:

- Increased likelihood of college enrollment
- Increased likelihood of college completion and degree attainment





Benefits of WBL for Business & Industry

- Helps businesses meet their worker needs
- Increases productivity
- Increases retention
- Builds their reputation and social capital
- Return on investment (ROI) also businesses top reason for engaging!
- Example apprenticeship ROI:
 - \$1.47 return for every \$1 invested (international study)
 - \$1.26 return for every \$1 invested (South Carolina study)

Work-Based Learning & Advancing Equity

- Work-based learning can help advance local, regional, and state equity goals
- Three ways work-based learning can benefit students, particularly marginalized students:
 - Builds positive relationships with adults
 - Builds social networks and professional skills
 - Exposure to new work environments and expectations
- Research supports this
 - Increases underserved student persistence and graduation
 - Compensating students for WBL experiences is a best practice





Common Barriers to WBL

- Transportation
- Incentivizing experiences
- DACA students and access
- School schedules/logistics
- Requirements of placement

Funds available to incentivize supporting WBL experiences for learners









Oregon Youth Employment Program (ORS 660.353)

\$9 million to provide meaningful work experience and workforce training for persons between the ages of 14 and 24, with a priority on underserved and underrepresented youth.

Participants receive:

- Minimum wage for time spent working
- Support in creating an individual development plan that outlines work readiness, career, and education goals
- Exposure to in-demand occupations and targeted sectors
- Academic support for earning credit and/or completing a high school equivalency program
