JOINT TASK FORCE ON STATEWIDE EDUCATOR SALARY SCHEDULES WRAPS **UP WORK**

While everyone pays attention to the Oregon Legislature closely when it is in Session, the interim period between legislative sessions is often just as busy. Multiple legislative task forces and workgroups on topics as varied as accountability, substitute teachers, and student attendance have been meeting regularly since the end of the 2023 Session. The Joint Task Force on Statewide Educator Salary Schedules wrapped up its work and **issued their report in September**.

The 14-member task force was created by Senate Bill 283 (2023 Session) and was co-chaired by Senator Michael Dembrow and Rep. Courtney Neron, who chair the Senate and House Education committees respectively. Per the final report, the task force was "directed to study and make recommendations regarding statewide salary schedules for Oregon educators and to consider regional differences in statewide systems of educator pay and differential pay for educators who serve special education students." COSA was ably represented on the Task Force by OASE President and Vale School District Superintendent, Dr. Alisha McBride.

Ultimately, the task force adopted **14 recommendations**, but not unanimously - Dr. McBride and other school district representatives opposed some proposals. The recommendations varied widely from the need to have more education workforce data to the expansion of apprenticeship programs for educators to consistent job classifications for classified staff from district to district. A key proposal from Dr. McBride and other district representatives on the task force that was adopted recommends the convening of a workgroup on educator compensation to truly understand the fiscal costs and policy challenges of a statewide salary scale before any legislative proposals are considered.

Ultimately, it will be up to the Legislature to decide whether or not to move forward with any of the task force recommendations. The COSA team wants to sincerely thank Dr. McBride for participating in almost 50 hours of task force meetings and clearly articulating the perspectives of COSA members and administrators from across the state.


EDUCATION EXPEDITION: HITTING THE RIGHT NOTE AT HARMONY ACADEMY



This month's expedition led us to Harmony Academy, a tuitionfree public recovery high school in Lake Oswego. We sat down with Dr. Tony Mann, Molalla River SD Superintendent & Cofounder of Oregon Recovery High School Initiative and Harmony Academy, as well as Harmony Academy Principal, Sharon Dursi Martin as they shared about how this initiative came to fruition and why it's working so well.

The building is tucked in a serene grove of towering Douglas fir trees, with history overflowing from every corner. What became abundantly clear was the amount of joy present at Harmony Academy. For students who were otherwise cast aside, they have found belonging and accountability in one another. The adults are rooted firmly in their support of and belief in kids, taking on creative approaches foster to engagement.

Dr. Mann attributes much of the success to building a "coalition of the willing" across sectors and relying on data to deliver results.



Dursi Martin added to why recovery high schools are successful: "we meet kids where they are, but we don't leave them there." Dursi Martin also speaks to the cultural specificity of adolescents, and how the interventions used on adults aren't as successful in young people. Having some autonomy over their recovery has been a critical element in long term sobriety and success for students.

"It's not about being 'good'. It's about freedom. The more we can help kids find their own power and agency, the greater changes they can make in their lives."

Due to the coordination and efforts of Dr. Mann, Principal Dursi Martin and others on the Oregon Recovery High School Initiative, HB 2767 passed, enabling 3 new recovery high schools to open in the 2024-25 school year, and an additional 3 schools each biennium until 9 schools have been opened.

As far as advice goes to those opening new recovery high schools or beginning similar journeys, Dr. Mann and Dursi Martin both shared the importance of maintaining hope and leading with the heart.
