WHAT IS ESSA?

EVERU STUDENT SUCCEEDS ACT



- Most recent version of the federal government's biggest K-12 law, the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which first came into effect in 1965
- Main goal: to advance education equity
- Replaces the 2001 reauthorization known as No Child Left Behind and subsequent ESEA Flexibility Waivers, which expired in August 2016
- Provides more state and local control; flexibility
- Retains safeguards to ensure appropriate accountability/responsibility

EARLY LEARNING POLICY OPPORTUNITIES

- States may consider including evidence of PreK-3rd grade classroom quality or student progress as an indicator in their revised state accountability systems.
- As states revise their educator evaluation systems, they may create new tools, methods or guidance on how to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of PreK-3rd grade teachers.
- As states revise their school improvement and support efforts, they may incorporate data on PreK-2nd grade learning opportunities/student progress in school-level needs assessments or diagnostic reviews, and use of evidence-based early childhood interventions to assist their lowest performing schools.
